In this course students will begin by analyzing films for the various ways to develop plot, manipulate the viewer through sound, and create a visual work of art through angles. Students will learn the components of filmmaking in order to analyze different genres of film through written responses and discussions. After looking at the bigger picture, each student will be able to write a screenplay for possible filming after peer review and editing. Throughout the writing process, students will use tutorials on how to use a screenwriting app and look at other scripts and how they are developed. Students will have the chance to learn of the different angles in film in order to help them create their own storyboards for a possible production. The whole class will get a glimpse into the art of sound production, makeup, prop construction, and costume design that are all parts of any great film.
